For a variety of reasons, the Townshend Town Report, as it has been done in the past, was not produced this year.

I have gathered most, if not all, of the *official* information that was available at Town Meeting this year. Some of this was picked up in hard copy, some of it was sent to me electronically.

A variety of methods have been used to try to combine everything in to one report. Some items were scanned using OCR and many documents that were given to me electronically lost proper formatting as I converted them. So, it is not, by any means, a polished document. It also may not be fully searchable.

Here, to the best of my ability, is the complete "Townshend Town Report" for 2016/2017.

This letter is to follow up on our meeting that took place on November 2, 2016.

Effective November 2, 2016, we have suspended our independent audit of the Town's June 30, 2016 financial statements due to significant concerns over the Town's accounting function. We have reached this decision reluctantly and after substantial deliberation because of the condition of the Town's accounting records. We commenced our audit fieldwork in October 2016. At that time, it was apparent the Town was not ready for the audit.

As discussed during our meeting, our recommendation to the Town is to engage a qualified firm or individual to assist the Town to perform "fresh start" accounting and implement the proper procedures and policies to ensure the accounting function of the Town is in place and is occurring. As the auditors, our firm is not allowed to perform any management or recordkeeping function.

Our firm has recommended a qualified firm for you to speak to. We are also committed to helping the Town going forward to implement best practices to ensure the June 30, 2017 audit can be completed.

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

JANUARY 1, TO DECEMBER 31, 2016

Although there is no Town Report this year, I felt I still needed to bring a few things to your attention.

The first concern has to do with official positions within the town. All elected and appointed positions require that a variety of duties be performed. Accepting a position and agreeing to serve, whether elected or appointed, is a serious commitment and should not be undertaken lightly. Members of the Select Board, as an example, must attend Select Board Meetings as well as participate in Board of Civil Authority Meetings, Abatement Meetings and Tax Appeal Hearings. Justices of the Peace are not only elected to perform weddings; they also have a significant and indeed vital role to play in the Town's business, particularly in attending those same meetings as well as counting votes at town meetings and elections.

Those of you who run for these positions, or agree to be appointed, MUST realize that they are jobs requiring time and effort which are essential for the smooth conduct of the Town's business. I realize there is little to no thanks for what you do, but if you agree to run or accept appointment, you must also agree to assume your fair share of the obligations and responsibilities. It really puts a strain on other members of boards to carry the load if you fail to come to the meetings and perform your duties.

The second matter to bring to your attention is that the State has implemented an online voter registration process called My Voter Page. By using the My Voter Page, a registered voter can:

Check registration status;

View information on upcoming elections;

Access voter specific elections information, including directions to a polling place and polling hours;

View a sample ballot;

Request and track an absentee ballot;

and much more.

I encourage voters to log into their My Voter Page to learn more. Registered Voters can log in at: http://mvp.sec.state.vt.us Online registration can be found at: http://olvr.sec.state.vt.us

On another note regarding voter registration, as of January 1, 2017 the DMV began implementing Automatic Voter Registration. The change made to the law by this bill is simple: When a person gets a new license, renews a license, or files an address change at the DMV, the information submitted is transmitted to the Secretary of State's Office, Elections Division, and then to the individual towns for voter registration purposes. That means a person is automatically registered as a voter, even if they don't meet the qualifications, unless they check a box on the form that says they "opt-out". (Previously the person had to check a box to say they did want the information used for voter registration, now they have to check the box to say they do not; it has shifted from an "opt-in" system, to an "opt-out.") It is important to make sure that if you do not want to become a registered voter, are not eligible to become one, or if there are no changes on your current license, you need to check the "opt-out" box.

I started my report above by noting that there is no Town Report this year. The reason for this is that we were unable to find enough people to take on the responsibility to prepare it. It has traditionally been the Auditors job but last year we voted to eliminate that office, and no one stepped up to take over that role. Please keep in mind that this is YOUR town. Efforts put into improving it make it better for everyone - whether in elected, appointed or volunteer positions - but sadly, too often people simply want to criticize the efforts of others, which is discouraging to say the least. If you cannot find a way to help make our town continue to work, at least please don't denigrate those who try.

Again, I have to say thanks to my assistants Kathy Hege, Dick Jackson and Kurt Tietz for their help and assistance in the day to day running of my office, and, of course, thanks again to all the residents of the town for believing in me and giving me the opportunity to serve as Town Clerk.

DELINQUENT TAX COLLECTOR 2015-2016 REPORT

After receiving the warrant in June of 2016 for \$140,879.53, the total in delinquent taxes owed to the Town of Townshend was \$151,254.48. Prior to receiving the warrant, the total due for delinquent taxes was \$27,705.16. I held a tax sale in April 2016 in which one property was auctioned off and has since not been redeemed by its original owner. I am currently in the process of another tax sale.

The tax sale that I am working on right now consists of eleven properties and about \$33,000 in delinquent taxes. The tax sale is scheduled for March 24, 2017 at 10:00 am at the Town Hall. The struggle remains with deceased property owners with delinquent taxes where there is no estate or death certificate on file which are needed to enter the properties into probate court. The remaining dollars on my list are under monthly payment arrangements with me to pay their balances off within 12 months.

I do my best to work with everyone and stick to my policy that I implemented when I began collecting delinquent taxes. I would be happy to serve the Town in this position for another year.

Townshend Cemetery Commission Annual Report, Nov. 2016

All town owned and maintained cemeteries received the usual annual care. For our purposes this means each cemetery was maintained at least three times. The first check is usually in April to see if there has been any winter damage. Flags are put out in all cemeteries in May. The cleanup for most of the smaller cemeteries is in June/July and then a final check and cleanup is done in the fall when the flags are removed. Of course some cemeteries receive regular mowing, and we thank Wayne Beattie, Russell Petronic, and Domenick Schmidt for their good work.

The biggest issues the Commission has had to deal with is money and trees. We have raised the lot, annual care, and endowed care fees this past year. We are also asking for more money in the "Old Cemetery" article in the town warning. Oakwood and Round Hill cemeteries still have money in their "retained interest" accounts, but that may run out in the future. If so, the town may have to take over the full expense of cemetery maintenance. How to avoid that – generate more income. Anyone with ideas or wishes to make a tax deductible donation towards future cemetery care, please let us know.

Regarding trees – over the winter a large tree fell into the Brigham/Bixby (sometimes called Holland) cemetery. As of this writing the tree has only partially been removed. This is due to access issues with the surrounding landowner. Hopefully this issue will be resolved in the near future. The tree issue is complex. Most of the cemeteries in town do not have trees in them. The trees fall from outside the cemetery. The issue then becomes who is responsible for the damage. All gravestones and the other stuff that goes with them (benches, flower pots, etc.) are not owned by the town. Collecting for damage is therefore difficult. In order to help, the Commission has been advised to send a letter to all the abutters informing them trees are a problem. If this is done, it might be possible to collect for some of the damage. In an ideal world the landowner would simply step up and offer to cover the damage costs. So far, in previous incidents over the years, this has not happened.

The Commission wishes to thank the Nancy Tracy family for their generous donations towards the repairs of the Holland/Brigham/Bixby cemetery. They are relatives of the Hollands and the Brighams. The Commission also wants to acknowledge the many contributions to the Cemetery Commission of Anne Tobey a former agent of the Commission. She died November 29th and was living in Brattleboro.

Finally the Commission continues to work on official written rights of ways to the land locked cemeteries in town. Until this process is complete, the Commission will continue to use the so-called "traditional" access paths. The question has come up "what about the general public"? Our advice is that to visit a land locked cemetery, the general public should ask the land owner, not the Cemetery Commission.

Townshend Volunteer Fire Department Annual Report Nov. 2016

This has been an active year for training due to the efforts of Glen Beattie and the coordination with several other local departments to have combined training sessions on specific fire issues. As a result we have had several members regularly attending these meetings and we thank them for their dedication. As a result of some of this training, we hope to have several qualified interior fire fighters.

To accomplish this, we are currently raising money to update the Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) equipment that we have. If anyone wishes to contribute to this effort we would appreciate it.

In terms of calls, we are running about the same number of calls as we have had for the past few years. One difference is the significant rise in the number of requests to support the DHART landings at Onyon Field. This support is done in conjunction with the Newbrook Fire Department. We thank Dave and Janice for their contribution towards these efforts. The other increase is with alarm related calls. To those who have built in alarm systems please inform the department as to who is the contact person if the owner or property manager is not on site at the time of the incident

We have been fortunate to have several new members to the department. We welcome additional members. We meet twice a month and have a regular training program. Contact Chief Winot if interested in joining. We also have had two long time members retire from active service. Irv Stowell, formally our Lieutenant, and Phil Trevorrow, formally one of our Engineers are still members, but inactive. We thank them for their long and dedicated service.

Some other on-going projects. We are in the process of giving all the water sources in town an identifying number. Once this is done a map similar to the 911 house map will be created. This map will then be shared with our mutual aid departments and Keene Dispatch. At 2 AM being able to find water quickly will be an asset. People in town that have bridges, solar panels, and automatic generators, are being asked to share information about them so we can build a data base on how to deal with them if there is an incident at that property. If you have any of these, please share this information with us.

For more than ten years it's been my responsibility to submit this report and fill you in on what's been happening at your library for the previous year. Each time I do my best to make it as informative as possible in the space allowed and try to give you a snapshot of the year's accomplishments. This year I wanted to remind you that the library is much more than the statistics and check out numbers that I usually provide; libraries enrich people's lives in many ways.

People use our library for various reasons. Older children can find a quiet place to get some homework done while waiting for an afterschool activity to begin, other students get tutoring help. Younger children and their families enjoy the weekly socializing at playgroups that are offered with our partner Early Educational Services. West River Valley Thrives and the town's Community Hope & Action organization make use of our meeting room in the Library's off hours as the local Happy Homemakers, and American Legion groups have done in the past. Others will tell you it is a great place to work with someone on our public access computers or to spend time waiting to visit a friend at Grace Cottage or for a car being repaired.

I'm very happy to report that the Friends of Townshend Library group is reestablishing itself with Maija Schmidt agreeing to take the lead this year. She and a small group took on the large task of holding a book and bake sale with the proceeds benefiting the Library. The trustees and I are very grateful to them for taking this on. They are also helping to organize an event this winter highlighting the tremendous feats of the Shackleton Expedition that took place over 100 yrs ago.

So yes, 817 people attended programs offered at the Library including our storyhours, summer reading program, book club and knit/crochet nights. There were 7929 items checked out from our collection of over 14200 items among the 5980 visitor that stopped in. That number doesn't include the people checking out our online offerings. This was accomplished with the trustees and other staff as well as our wonderful volunteers, Mary Moberly, Jean Danilow, Pam Russo, & Jen Clary.
